The field of fire fighting has changed substantially over the last decade. Gone are the smoke-eaters of old, running into burning buildings with no protective gear save an insulated coat.

This century's firefighter is a new breed, focused on safety, customer service and public education.

Structure fires have been in steady decline, with no small thanks to the dedicated efforts of fire departments to educate the public and promote the use of extinguishers and smoke detectors.

In place of fires, departments like the Surrey Fire Service (SFS) are attending a dramatically increasing number of medical calls (almost 20,000 in 2010) and motor vehicle accidents (close to 4,000 in 2010). In fact, out of over 26,000 calls to the SFS in 2010, only 8,366 calls were fire related.

The changing nature of our calls requires a different type of firefighter.

Today, firefighters are mature, well educated individuals who represent the diverse nature of the community we serve. We encourage women and minorities to bring their own unique strengths and experiences to the service.










